


The Record

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Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

For some years I have been very interested in the subject of Christian community. In my first charge in Aberdeen I lived in a small city-centre community and I have long been a great admirer of the Iona Community in Scotland, the Taizé community in France and L'Arche communities in various countries around the world. I believe that the gift of salvation is communal and corporate through and through, drawing me as an individual into relationship not only with God but also with other believers who make up the Body of Christ. The New Testament has a Greek word for it—koinonia—and we catch tantalizing glimpses of it in passages in the Book of Acts where the Holy Spirit has been poured out and Christians find themselves bonding together in a profound sharing and a common life. We also sense something of what koinonia means in books like 1 and 2 Corinthians where it is being violated, as Christians are forgetting their corporate responsibilities to one another.

Koinonia, fellowship, is a particular challenge to a church like ours with a scattered congregation which can make it difficult to gather together as often as we might like, and where work schedules also limit our availability to one another. For some, attendance at worship on a Sunday morning is, for various reasons, about as much commitment to the church as we can manage, and even then possibly only occasionally. This may be inevitable and understandable, but it does put a limit on the growth of community, especially in a church like ours where people are continually coming and going and we are constantly saying 'hello' and 'goodbye'.

There are, however, things that we can do to enhance our *koinonia*. For example, communication is vital. People only feel they belong if they feel that they know what is going on (that's why this church magazine, *The Record*, is so important). Likewise, it is very important that we make the very most of the times when we do gather together – especially Sunday morning – and that these are opportunities for deepening relationships, for welcoming and getting to know new people and for communication.

As I write this letter I am anticipating a Consistory Evening and Away Day next weekend. At the start of a new year, four months into my ministry here and with three new elders ordained to the Consistory, this is a good time for us to get together and to review the life of the church and consider our priorities for the coming year. For this time away I have written a short paper giving some of my reflections on the church as I see it thus far. Thinking about what I have written for discussion, it strikes me that most of it – directly or indirectly—concerns this issue of community. Most of my observations and suggestions are about how we can improve *koinonia* amongst us. I do not want to preempt our discussions but I imagine that some changes will result and some new initiatives will emerge. I am not a believer in change for change's sake, but if and where the church is asked to embrace change in the near future it will, I think, be spurred mainly by this concern.

I very much hope that the new year has begun well for you and that in the coming months I will get to know many of you better—and enjoy a rich experience of *koinonia*.

Consistory Meetings of December & January

Looking back at a festive Christmas period, with special services (involving the children in a Nativity play), Advent activities, a more than full church on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day, and giving thanks to all who participated and helped, the New Year started.

Membership matters: Nick Thomas and Laura Elliot were accepted into membership by resolution of Consistory.

Reint Huizinga had his planned foot operation on 23 January.

Lotty Veelbehr was admitted temporarily into a nursing home for rehabilitation after having a few falls in her home.

A number of people have come forward expressing the wish to become members of our church. Consistory is planning a form in which new members would be welcomed during a service.

Consistory: Mattia informed Consistory that he would be leaving for London early in the new year to work for his company there for about half a year. Mattia will remain serving on Consistory.

Following up on the decision made at our last meeting (members of Consistory are elders, the term 'deacon' will not be used), a proposal was discussed about the number of years an elder can serve on Consistory. It was decided that it would be four times six years. At the end of each six-year term an evaluation would be held.

Judi Haynes-Smart, Laura Elliot and Nick Thomas accepted the nomination by Consistory to become elders. After reading the edict on two consecutive Sundays, the new elders were ordained in the service of 25 January. The deacons Christa Oudshoorn-Hobo, Mattia Falcone, Giles Francis, Thijs Glasz and Heleen Koning made the transition into eldership.

Heleen Koning accepted the nomination by Consistory to become the new Scriba. Plans were made for the Consistory retreat on 30 & 31 January.

Stichting Het Begijnhof: With the court case appeal about the opening times of the Begijnhof still pending, Pastor Lance and two members of Consistory met as neighbours with some residents of the square in a cordial atmosphere. Everyone would like the matter to be resolved.

Finances: The income and expenditures of October and November 2014 were discussed. We were very grateful to see that the letter of appeal sent out to the congregation at the end of last year resulted in kind donations in the order of €7,750. The fundraising committee will continue to work on various plans, such as giving the donations chest in the vestibule of the church a more prominent position.

Other matters: Pastor Lance Stone will be away on February 15 and 22. Members of the congregation will preach on these Sundays.

On the second weekend of March Baafi Sekyere and the minister will be attending the meeting of the International Presbytery (the new name of the Presbytery of Europe). The Rev. Douglas Gay from Glasgow will be leading the service then.

The next Consistory meeting will be held on 2 February.

Holy Week Services

The Easter services this year will follow their usual pattern, with one new addition. These are as follows, with a word of explanation about the additional Easter Service of Light and Renewal of Baptismal vows:

Maundy Thursday, 2 April, 8:00pm: Maundy Thursday Holy Communion service

Good Friday, 3 April, 7:30pm: service with our choir Saturday, 4 April, 9:00pm: Easter Service of Light & Renewal of Baptismal Vows

The Saturday service is a wonderful way of welcoming in Easter Day (it should really be held either at midnight or very early on Easter Sunday, but we will hold it at 9:00pm on Saturday, on the principle that in the Jewish calendar the day begins on the previous evening at nightfall). This is a service, rich in symbolism, in which we recall the great acts of God in creation and redemption and the banishing of darkness by the light of the risen Christ. The service, which lasts about 45 minutes, ends with a renewal of baptismal vows and a recommitment to following Jesus. All are welcome!

Lent Bible Studies

During Lent we will be holding Bible Studies on Wednesday evenings at 7:30pm, running from Wednesday, 25 February through to Wednesday, 25 March. There are five sessions in all.

These will take the form of a series on Mark's Gospel from which our Gospel readings in church each Sunday are mostly taken this year. We will be using a book written by Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, called *Meeting God in Mark*, which is based on a Lent course he led some years ago. It comes highly recommended.

The shortest and most condensed of the Gospels, Mark is often commended for getting to the very heart of Jesus' ministry and of what it means to be a disciple.

Sunday School/Junior Church

We are greatly blessed with a dedicated group of teachers for our children—but we could always do with more! Does anyone think that God might be calling them to join the rota of teachers—either Sunday School (ages 4-11) or Junior Church (ages 12-15)? We could especially use some more helpers for the Junior Church. If you think you might help, please let me know.
