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Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

A couple of Sundays ago we held our Remembrance Sunday service, as always, and I thought that in this letter I would comment on one feature of the service - or perhaps I should say one feature absent from the service. I know this has been commented on by some, and I think it is something that raises important wider issues. I refer to the fact that we no longer sing the national anthems (Dutch and British) during the service, as was once the custom.

I would begin by saying that this is not out of any disrespect for the national anthems. It has, however, to do with what is and what is not appropriate in a church service. In the Bible the church is described as 'the holy nation' (1 Peter 2:9, referring back to Exodus 19:6), which is set apart and made up of people from every nation, tribe and tongue. It is the one place where all nations come together and national identities take second place to our oneness in Christ. We rejoice in having such an international congregation at the ERC and we gladly proclaim at our entrance, 'within these walls let no-one be a stranger'. That is a wonderful sentiment but it is about more than just being a friendly church - it has deeper theological groundings. In the New Testament Letter to the Ephesians Paul writes that we are no longer 'strangers' but citizens and members of the household of God. In other words we cannot be strangers for we share a common citizenship in God's house. This is one of the glorious features of the Church: our primary citizenship is in God's Kingdom and not in earthly nations, and indeed this is where there is real hope of peace and reconciliation for the world. So having a national anthem, or singling out one or two, goes against our very nature as the church. (As a matter of fact, as God's holy nation we do have 'national anthems' - they are called 'hymns' and we sing them every week!).

Every year on the day before Remembrance Sunday I lead a service at De Nieuwe Ooster cemetery on Saturday, where there are graves of fallen servicemen. That is a civic occasion in the presence of the Burgemeester and we sing national anthems - the British, the Dutch and the Polish and that is entirely right and appropriate. But when we move into the church the next day, it is different.

For some, Remembrance Sunday is a very moving occasion as they have memories of conflicts and of loved ones lost or scarred in them. At the English Reformed Church we aspire to do this with reverence and dignity, but it is important to remember what is distinctive about us as a church. I do not know if you will agree with this explanation of why the anthems have been omitted in recent years, but I hope you appreciate there is a reason, and that such changes are not made lightly.

Lastly, with Christmas approaching fast, I would wish you every blessing in this coming season of Advent and Christmas and a joyful New Year.

Alexander Noordijk started as student minister in the beginning of October and preached for the first time in church on November 4.

Property

The maintenance work on the floors in the consistory room and the deaconry room is finished. We had some issues with the heating, but these are solved.

An enquiry was received by the organizers of the Mondriaan exhibition "Het Spirituele pad", in Winterswijk. As a result, someone came to the ERC to take several pictures of the ERC pulpit, which bears a beautiful bas-relief by Piet Mondriaan. Dear Friends, while the year comes to an end, it is a good moment to reflect on it from a financial point of view, too.

The discussion with the Church of Scotland about the increasing contribution of the congregation of the International Presbytery (IP) is ongoing. It is highly complex and not easy - and it seems there is a long way to go to come to a solution. The good news is, that now all congregational treasurers of the IP are starting to form one voice; that we are committed to support the bigger church, but this should not jeopardize our financial sustainability. I will inform you once substantial progress has been made.

Talking about financial sustainability: Our income continues to decline slightly but steadily year after year. At this moment it is “only” EUR 2.500 lower than in the previous year - but increased expenses (e.g. for maintenance, energy, and also the contribution to the Church of Scotland) causes a deficit of almost EUR 8.000 at this moment. This already includes a contribution of EUR 12.500 by the “Friends of the English Reformed Church” for maintenance, otherwise our deficit would have been more than EUR 20.000. We still have some reserves to compensate for this deficit, but they are declining steadily and have never been so low, since I have been your treasurer.

I want to encourage you all to contemplate and pray, if you could increase your monetary contribution to our church. Especially as all your donation into our bank account may be tax beneficial as we have the so called ANBI status (if you need more information about this, please do not hesitate to contact me).

It was a year of a lot of discussion and uncertainties and therefore it is good to know that GOD has HIS Good plan to provide us with the necessary means to sustain in worshipping Him. The food run

As I have been requested to write about the Food Run, I take it as an opportunity to canvas The Netherlands against other European countries, and back to our groceries shopping habits.

The Food Run has a pre-quel in the Bread Run which I set up in 2000, with the immediate aid of Thys Polstra and Gilles Van Den Berge, on a 7days per week basis, picking up bread at LaPlace and distributing to Mother Theresa's Sisters of Charity, a.o.. After that initial year and a half, I was grateful Gilles and Magdala Van Den Berge took over the coordination of the picking up schedule of the car owners within the church, as well as the coordination of the backup schedule. Until the closing down of V&D, I was able to get the pre Voedselbank, the original founder of it Regina McKnack, as well as De Kloof involved, on the condition each do the picking up themselves on their designated days .



Fast Forward to 2015, I set up the Food Run, working closely with Ekoplaza as an organic grocer and with BuurtBuik - Voedsel Verbindt, providing the surplus food for their 3 times a week (*car owners for Sunday right after church are particularly welcome*) open days for soup, made by a chef from the provided vegetables and for the food packages, for people who missed out on the official Voedselbank strict regulations. Having started out with a single Ekoplaza branch, now the picking up schedule comprises 9 volunteers/ car owners and 8 Ekoplaza's on a 7days a week basis. Buurtbuik.nl has stretched their portfolio of grocery providers with 3 branches of Jumbo supermarkets and still developing.

From a helicopter view, France has installed laws on the supermarket chains with 70+ cash registers, Casino, Carrefour, etc, they themselves reach out to charities for the destination of their surplus food on a daily basis.

Until then in The Netherlands as well as in the UK the statistics ruefully apply that 40+% is surplus, thrown away, more often than not into locked containers. A BBC series visited and awarded British households the worth in money, as to what families would buy and throw away their groceries, even before BestBefore date, being 40%.The amount in cash was an incentive for the families to look closer into their family groceries shopping habits.

The just recently introduced App #2good2go showed an immediate response by grocers, restaurants and consumers alike. On a daily basis, grocers and restaurants offer food packages worth EUR 9 for EUR 3, and dishes of EUR 21 for EUR 7 respectively, a discount of 66%. By far a WinWin. The incentive shows that the bigger issue is not how the past BestBeforeDate food gets to the consumer, but rather how the consumer is more aware that the BestBeforeDate system actually is a mere agreement made by the supermarket conglomerate to be able to logistically move food off the shelf. The food itself is still good quite some longer, eg. old cheese. Waiting for the Dutch version of the French law, time will tell, if the App will be able to scale itself up, or being just a novelty, let's hope the first.

Our habits as in habitual behaviours, bordering dependency, have underlying bigger themes. Quite some items on our groceries list are fairly to extremely recently developed. Eg. our desire to return home with a holiday or sunbed tan only just started in the mid 20's when one young Coco Chanel was the first to return from the Deauville beach straight into the Paris salons sunburnt. The rest is history, is economy, is dermatology.

Pre Elizabethan England was the last age to have had honey, in moderation while costly, on their diet. Skull studies show that with the slave labour in the Americas, the gentry, followed by the upper class, and so forth top down, preceded in decaying teeth, by sugar made cheap and thus made accessible to ordinary people.

Grains, full with complex sugars which our body breaks down in highly nutritional parts, were replaced by the potato, technically a vegetable, also from the Americas. Corn flakes, technically popped corn, with sugar and milk added is any dentist and nutritionist bad dream on the effects on the long run to the teeth, and the poor nutritional value to the body.

Zooming out, we are, and yours truly included, the well targeted group of advertising of the food industry to get our sugar rush, available in almost everything we like, also and especially in salty foods, when walking the aisles of the supermarket.

Who's who: Alexander Noordijk

I had the pleasure to speak with Alexander, just after he started as a student minister in our church.

Alexander grew up in Mijnsheerenland, a village south of Rotterdam. He is an only child, and says he was spoiled by his parents. He was raised in the local Reformed church.

His mother from a reformed background, his father from a more liberal background: Remonstrants.

At the age of eight, Alexander was already preaching...to his teddy bears, who made for a very docile audience. At the age of 16, he found attending church very boring, and started skipping the service. His mother soon found out, discussed it with him, and suggested he attended an evangelical church. He found the services more attractive and attended several times.

After completing MAVO, and HAVO, he went on to study theology at the Christian graduate school in Ede. During those years, he opened up about homosexuality. He expected a problematic situation at school and work; his teachers actually advised him to discontinue his education.

Alexander switched to a totally different career: for many years he worked as a recruiter for airlines. He also did youth work, for JOP, jeugd organisatie protestantse kerk, youth work branch of PKN. Alexander met Kai, and they have been married for 10 years now.

In 2012, he decided to go back to the Christian graduate school in Ede, discussed what happened years ago, and was welcomed back to finish his bachelor training in Theology. For a master's degree, he continued at the VU, the free university of Amsterdam.

Currently in the final year of training, he was asked by the VU to work as a student minister in the ERC. Alexander had attended services in the building in the Begijnhof, but did not yet know the English Reformed Church. He will work with Lance and hopes to learn a lot about leading a congregation. He has already attended several activities like coffee morning, 20-30 s group. He feels at home and accepted in our community.

Alexander and Kai live in IJburg, a relatively new neighborhood of Amsterdam. Alexander started as a Minister at the Binnenwaai church in IJburg in January 2018. The Binnenwaai started in 2010 and is housed in a contemporary building. It is a missionary church. Alexander loves the informal atmosphere and the possibility of trying new ways to reach people in his neighborhood.

Although he calls himself a workaholic, he enjoys time off going out with friends, have a glass of wine, or watch a movie.

In the years ahead, he looks forward to working at Binnenwaai church, and expanding their activities.

Men's Group

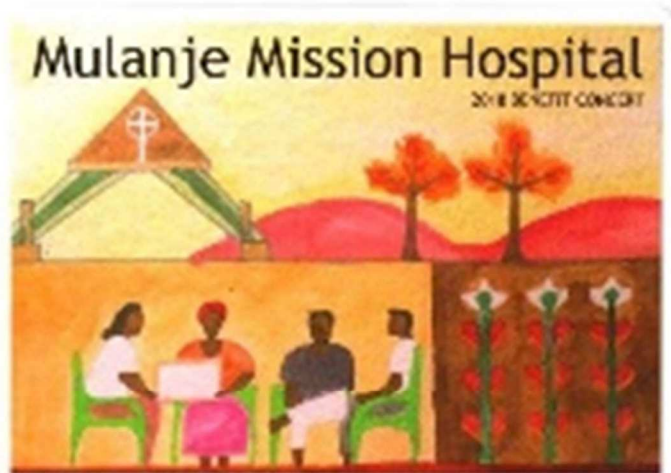

Junior Church update

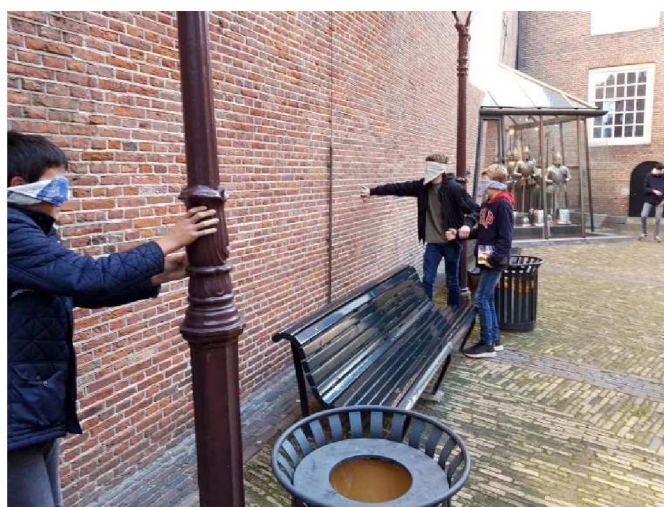
